The Danube-Carpathian region: a global hotspot for biodiversity

The region harbours many species and habitats that are either threatened or close to extinction in the rest of Europe

- Large natural and virgin forests
- Most of Europe's remaining intact rivers and wetlands
- Two-thirds of the European populations of large carnivores, including bears, lynx and wolves
- The Beluga sturgeon, now on the edge of extinction







The Carpathian mountains


Close to 100,000 km² of natural or semi/natural forests


- 36,000 km² of protected areas
- 3,000 km² of virgin forests
- 481 endemic plant species
- Viable population of all large herbivores
- Stronghold of the largest carnivore population in Europe
- Central Europe's last wilderness area











Working for sustainable development in the Carpathian region

The region is complex and split between different regions and programmes...

...in order to work successfully projects need to be:

- Trans-boundary
- Multi-stakeholder
- Multi-sectoral
- Multi-policy framework

The Carpathian Convention- a framework convention for a transnational issue

Adopted on 22nd May 2003 Entered in force on 4th January 2006

- Ratified by all the seven Carpathian countries
- Observer in the Working Group on Green Infrastructure and Restoration of the European Commission
- A framework Convention for cooperation and multi-sectoral policy coordination



Only existing legally binding framework and active stakeholder platform in the region...

The Secretariat of the Carpathian Convention







Since 2003 UNEP Vienna is hosting the Secretariat of the Carpathian Convention

- Development of new Protocols
- Establishment of strategic partnerships with key actors in the region, towards the realization of strategic projects and initiatives within the Carpathians and beyond.
- Cooperation with thematic Working Groups
- Activities specifically related to Biodiversity, Climate Change, Spatial Planning and connectivity, Agriculture and Rural Development, Industry, Energy, Transport and Infrastructure and Sustainable Tourism

Protocol on Conservation and Sustainable Use of Biological and Landscape diversity

(Entered into force in 2010)

- Working Group on Conservation and Sustainable Use of Biological and Landscape Diversity
- Steering Committee of the Carpathian Network of Protected Areas (CNPA)
- Carpathian Wetlands Initiative (CWI)
- Elaboration of a draft proposal of a Carpathian Red list of species and habitats









The Carpathian Convention and Biodiversity: Related Projects





Duration: 2010 - 2013



<u>Carpathian Project</u>: Protection and Sustainable Development of the Carpathians in a Transnational Framework

Duration: 2005 – 2008

Alpine-Carpathian Corridor: the project aims to safeguard the ecological connectivity between the Alps and the Carpathians in order to secure migration and genetic exchange among wildlife populations in the Centrope region

Duration: 2008 - 2012



Another multi-stakeholder project: Ecopotential

The main objective: making Earth Observation and Monitoring Data usable for ecosystem modeling and services

This will be done in selected Protected Areas in Europe, with a strong focus on mountain ecosystems, including a specific pilot site in the Carpathians.

Project funded by Horizon2020 Research Programme UNEP is part of a 47 organizations-partnership

Total budget: 15 million over four years

- **Joint Alpine-Carpathian Statement on** Adaptation to Climate Change, jointly presented at UNFCCC COP 20 in Lima by the Czech and Italian Presidencies
- **Strategic Agenda on Adaptation to Climate** Change in the Carpathian Region finalized



The Carpathian Convention and Climate Change: Related Projects



CARPVIA - Carpathian integrated assessment of vulnerability to climate change and ecosystem based adaptation measures



CarpathCC - Climate change framework project aiming to provide an in-depth of the vulnerability of the Carpathian region and establish a diversified portfolio of adaptation measures



CARPATCLIM - Project aiming to improve the basis of climate data in the Carpathian region for applied regional climatological studies





The Carpathian Convention and Sustainable Transport

- The Protocol on Sustainable Transport was finalized
- The Action plan for a regional framework approach for promotion of renewable energy in the Carpathian region was finalized







Related projects: access 2 mountain

Sustainable Mobility and Tourism in Sensitive Areas of the Alps and the Carpathians

Objective: achieve durable, environmentally friendly tourism, as well as to ensure accessibility and connection to, between and in sensitive regions of the Alps and the Carpathians

Duration: 2011-2014







Cooperation with ICPDR



- Joint Declaration between ICPDR and Carpathian Convention on cooperation in the Tisza Basin
- Close cooperation with ICPDR on the EUSDR in the Danube area: promotion of the implementation of the "Guiding principles sustainable hydropower development in the Danube Basin" (DECISION COP4/3 par 2)




EU Strategy for the Danube Region (EUSDR)
